## About the Organizers



The Young Ecosystem Service Specialists (YESS) is an association of early-career researchers in the field of ecosystem services, affiliated with the Ecosystem Services Partnership (ESP). YESS has over 500 members including post-graduate students, early-career scientists and practitioners.

The primary aim of the group is to stimulate exchange of ideas, identify knowledge gaps and improve possibilities for training and capacity building in relation to ecosystem services science and practice. This network aims to achieve actual co-operation, explore ideas for innovative research and gain experience in critical thinking and science communication.



WABES is an initiative with the primary objective of facilitating networking and capacity building across West Africa to support the work programmes and, in particular, scientific assessments of the World Biodiversity Council, the Intergovernmental Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES).

As part of its networking activities, training workshops, which bring together Biodiversity & Ecosystem Services (BES) experts from universities, research institutions, government agencies, non-governmental organisations (NGOs) and Indigenous and local knowledge (ILK) holders in West Africa and beyond, are conducted to serve as exchange platforms and distribution hubs for IPBES developments. WABES is funded by the International Climate Initiative (IKI) of the German Federal Ministry for the Environment, Nature Conservation and Nuclear Safety (BMU).
