ICWE, in cooperation with the Swedish Programme for ICT in developing regions (SPIDER) and the ICT4D Collective/UNESCO Centre for ICT4D at Royal Holloway, University of London are conducting an international survey on the take-up of eLearning in African organisations and educational institutions.

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
